## God Appears to Solomon (1 Kings 3:4-5). The record of Solomon's reign begins with two violations:



- 1. He knew he had a great and important job to do, and he knew he was not prepared to do it (v. 7).
- **2.** He knew the greatness of the nation of Israel and that to lead as king was very important (v.8).
- **3.** He asked for understanding and judgment (v.9).

It is interesting to note that Solomon did not ask for righteousness. Righteousness can only come through the shed blood of the Lord Jesus Christ, the Lamb of God. The sacrifices Solomon made were designed to teach him that only the shedding of blood can take away our sins. The sacrifices of the Old Testament were designed to point to the great sacrifice Jesus would make for everyone.

Right at the very start, Solomon missed out on the more fundamental need for a righteous heart, one that David his father had. It is possible to have great wisdom, and yet lack righteousness of heart. This led to Solomon's downfall in years to come.

Yet Solomon's example teaches us that inner qualities were more important to bring about outward success. We often notice only the external parts of success and desire them, without realizing that it is in strengthening the inner man that truly

Matthew Henry's Commentary: 1 Kings 3:1-4

We are here told concerning Solomon,

Something that was unquestionably good, for which he is to be praised and in which he is to be imitated. 1. He loved the Lord, 1 Kgs. 3:3. Particular notice was taken of God's love to him, 2 Sam. 12:24. He had his name from it: Jedidiah-beloved of the Lord. And here we find he returned that love, as John, the beloved disciple, was most full of love. Solomon was a wise man, a rich man; yet the brightest encomium of him is that which is the character of all the saints, even the poorest, He loved the Lord, so the Chaldee; all that love God love his worship, love to hear from him and speak to him, and so to have communion with him. 2. He walked in the statutes of David his father, that is, in the statutes that David gave him, 1 Kgs. 2:2, 3; 1 Chron. 28:9, 10 (his dying father's charge was sacred, and as a law to him), or in God's statutes, which David his father walked in before him; he kept close to God's ordinances, carefully observed them and diligently attended them. Those that truly love God will make conscience of walking in his statutes. 3. He was very free and generous in what he did for the honour of God. When he offered sacrifice he offered like a king, in some proportion to his great wealth, a thousand burnt-offerings, 1 Kgs. 3:4. Where God sows plentifully he expects to reap accordingly; and those that truly love God and his worship will not grudge the expenses of their religion. usus
